The loli does not have eyes.



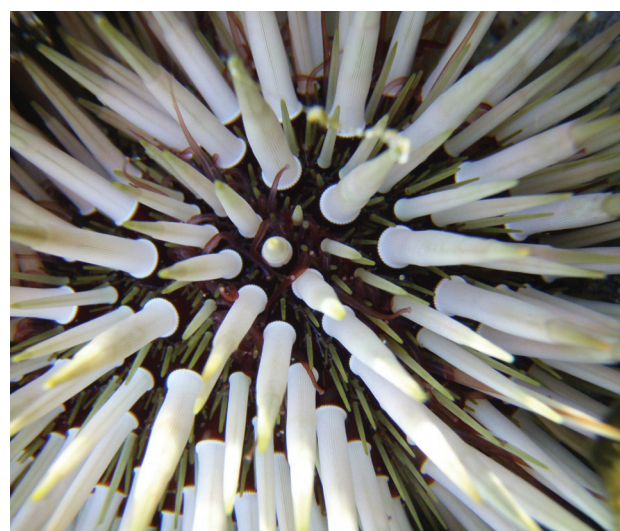
The puhi has teeth.
